

This Week . . .

In chapter 20, "We Love Others," your child learned that the Commandments tell us to love and respect other people, ourselves, and all God's creation. The last seven Commandments name the ways we are to live the second part of the Great Commandment and truly live as children of God.

Read together the Bible story in Acts of the Apostles 2:42–47. Emphasize that this story tells about the first Christians living the Commandments as Jesus taught.

In this chapter your child prayed for others. This is called a prayer of intercession. Read and pray together the prayer on page 179.

Making a Difference

Choose one of the following activities to do as a family or design a similar activity of your own.

- Put each family member's name in a bowl. Have each person draw a name. Be sure that no one has drawn their own name. Within the week, each person is to do something for the person whose name they drew.
- Read together a children's book about treating people with respect. Discuss why showing respect is at the heart of our love for others.
- Identify and name ways your family shows respect for one another. For example, when you use kind words with each other or take good care of each other's belongings or cooperate with each other, and so on.
